Introduce yourself

My name is Mark Beattie. I am the Radiography Practice Educator at the Ulster Hospital.

What does your job entail?

I am the Radiography Practice Educator at the Ulster Hospital. My role involves managing, supervising, and supporting diagnostic radiography students from Ulster University during their clinical placements. I guide students in performing radiographic examinations on ward patients, trauma patients, and outpatients, emphasizing achieving the highest image quality with the lowest radiation dose. I also prepare practical and theoretical tutorials to reinforce their university-acquired knowledge. Additionally, I review students' written work, conduct assessments, and collaborate with the university to communicate students' progress during placements. In cases where students face challenges, I work closely with the university to develop strategies and support mechanisms to help them meet placement outcomes.

How did you get into this line of work?

After school, I wasn't sure about my desired field of study. However, I knew I didn't want a desk job. Given that Biology was my favourite subject and I wanted to apply my knowledge of Biology and human anatomy, Radiography caught my attention when I was exploring university prospectuses. It seemed like a perfect fit for me.

Outline your career to date

I began my journey as a basic grade radiographer at the Ulster Hospital in 2006. During my initial years, I relished the experience as a junior staff member, learning the dynamics of teamwork among radiographers, honing effective communication with patients, and adapting to the daily challenges we encountered. Subsequently, I pursued training to become an ultrasonographer, a step that significantly expanded my skills within a multi-disciplinary team. This training equipped me with the ability to identify and diagnose common pathologies through ultrasound scans. In 2014, I took on the role of Radiography Practice Educator, marking a pivotal point in my career.

Tell us about your qualifications and training?

I graduated with a BSc Honors in Radiography from UU in 2006, followed by the completion of a PGD in Medical Ultrasound in 2010. In 2015, I undertook a standalone module titled 'Enhancing Teaching and Learning in the Practice Setting.' This qualification paved the way for me to attain Practice Educator Accreditation with the Society of Radiographers.

What qualities are required for your job, personal and professional?

Good communication skills are essential, you must be a good team player, you should be organised to help stay on top of a busy worklist. Radiographers should have a good eye for attention to detail.

What is the best advice you have ever received?

Have confidence in your abilities.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

I enjoy spending time with my wife and children. I am a keen cyclist/mountain biker.
